

## CLIMATE

### Building Decarbonization Measures, HB25-1269

Updates building energy performance standards, establishes penalties for noncompliance and creates a building decarbonization enterprise to support building owners with financial and technical assistance.

### Transit Reform, SB25-161

Strengthens the Regional Transportation District by making it more reliable and accessible, improving quality of life for Coloradans while reducing pollution.

### Transmission Lines in State Highway Rights-of-Way, HB25-1292

Facilitates clean energy transmission along state highways, making it easier to deliver renewable power across Colorado while mitigating impacts on communities and wildlife.

### Adding Nuclear Energy as a Clean Energy Resource, HB25-1040

We opposed the updated statutory definitions of 'clean energy' and 'clean energy resource' that include nuclear energy, except when used by public utilities for tax valuation purposes.

## COMMUNITIES & JUSTICE

### Colorado Voting Rights Act, SB25-001

Strengthens voter protections for Coloradans, expands access to voting for historically excluded communities and prohibits election practices that discriminate against communities of color.

### Redistribution of Lottery Fund, HB25-1215

Seeks to redistribute Colorado lottery funds to better support outdoor equity programs, local park infrastructure and strategic conservation efforts across the state.

### Worker Protection Collective Bargaining, SB25-005

Modernize Colorado's labor law, reducing barriers to workers unionizing their workplace through the elimination of a second election to win union security.

### Protect Civil Rights Immigration Status, SB25-276

Strengthens Colorado law by closing data privacy loopholes and reinforcing constitutional protections for everyone in public places like hospitals, schools and childcare centers. It also prohibits local law enforcement from honoring ICE detainer requests without a judicial warrant.

## LANDS & WATER

### Protection of Colorado's Public Lands, SJR25-009

This resolution recognizes the environmental, economic and cultural significance of Colorado's public lands while declaring bipartisan opposition to any efforts to sell or privatize them.

### Continued Wildlife Habitat Stamp Program, SB25-049

Reauthorizes Colorado's habitat stamp, a program that has generated over \$212 million, conserving 300,650 acres for wildlife and opening 156,000 acres for public use.

### Trust Lands Conservation & Recreation Work Group, HB25-1332

Establishes a working group that explores conservation, stewardship and public access opportunities on state trust lands.

### Limit Turf in New Residential Development, HB25-1113

Conserves water in urban areas by limiting grass lawns and artificial turf in new housing developments, encouraging more drought-friendly landscaping.

## YOU MAKE VICTORIES POSSIBLE

Community members spoke loud and clear: all Coloradans deserve a healthy environment and communities. During the 2025 legislative session, Conservation Colorado advocates made their voices heard, sending over 1,400 emails, making nearly 300 calls and testifying dozens of times, urging legislators to support our priority conservation bills.



Your advocacy helped achieve these key victories:

### CLIMATE & CLEAN AIR

- Passed two key policies to expand clean, reliable transit and reduce transportation pollution
- Made it easier to bring wind and solar power to communities by installing power lines along highways without harming wildlife
- Stopped a bill that would have given tax breaks to energy and water-intensive tech companies without environmental safeguards

### ENVIRONMENTAL JUSTICE

- Secured funding for the Outdoor Equity Grant Program to help historically excluded communities access parks and nature, benefiting mental and physical health

### LANDS & WATER

- Permanently reauthorized the Colorado Wildlife Habitat Program, which has protected 35,000+ acres of wildlife habitat and opened 150,000+ acres of land for outdoor activities
- Improved water quality in areas affected by historic mining and increased funding to address drought threat
- Protected public lands from efforts to sell or privatize them
