

CLIMATE & CLEAN AIR

SB26-150 Modernizing Regional Transportation District

Restructures the Regional Transportation District (RTD) by overhauling the elected board structure and improving accountability, accessibility and affordability of transit options.

HB26-1326 Sunset Public Utilities Commission

Extends the Public Utilities Commission (PUC) for seven years and updates energy, utility and transportation regulations to improve oversight, transparency and consumer protection.

HB26-1226 Manage Emissions from Electric Generating Units

Protects Coloradans from soaring electricity rates and threats to air quality associated with Trump's orders to keep dirty, costly coal fired power plants in operation. Requires transparency of impacts to ratepayers of the costs for coal generated electricity and installation of pollution reduction measures.

HB26-1430 Transportation Funding Adjustments

Protects K-12 schooling, higher education and healthcare from being defunded by a poorly crafted ballot measure that threatens to shift funding away from those needs and to highway construction.

ENVIRONMENTAL JUSTICE

SB26-002 Energy Affordability

Helps lower electricity costs for low-income households across the state by protecting and stabilizing the Percentage of Income Payment Plan (PIPP) program.

HB26-1272 Extreme Temperatures Worker Protections

Ensures workers have access to water, shade, shelter and breaks during extreme weather.

SB26-005 Rights Violation in Immigration Enforcement

Provides legal recourse for individuals whose constitutional rights are violated during civil immigration enforcement.

LANDS & WATER

SJR26-015 Protecting Colorado's National Public Lands

Reaffirms Colorado's bipartisan opposition to any efforts by the federal government to transfer, privatize or sell off public lands.

SB26-141 Wildlife Collision Prevention

Protects wildlife and travelers from vehicle collisions by providing dedicated funding and planning tools to create wildlife crossings and other safety measures.

HB26-1008 Colorado Outdoor Opportunities Act

Improves Coloradans' access to public lands and outdoor recreation while strengthening statewide planning, coordination and conservation of natural resources and wildlife.

HB26-1145 Mobile Home Park Water Quality

Strengthens the Mobile Home Park Water Quality Act by improving water quality testing requirements for mobile home park communities and helping ensure residents have access to clean, safe drinking water.



Your advocacy helped achieve these key victories:

Climate & Clean Air

- Blocked legislation offering excessive corporate handouts for energy-intensive data centers without sufficient climate or community protections — making sure Coloradans aren't left with higher energy bills and more pollution
- Strengthened the Public Utilities Commission (PUC) to help keep Colorado's clean energy transition on track, increase transparency and protect families from rising electricity costs
- Fought back against Trump's push to keep dirty coal plants running, securing new protections for ratepayers and air quality. Municipally owned utilities must cease burning coal after 2032, saving ratepayers money and protecting our air quality, and other coal plants must install pollution reduction technology
- Strengthened RTD's board structure to make Colorado's largest transit agency more accountable, reliable and affordable for riders
- Established a new statewide program to safely recycle electric vehicle batteries, keeping toxic materials out of landfills and ensuring they are reused in new batteries
- Protected K-12 education, healthcare and transit funding from being cut by a proposed highway-lobby ballot measure

Environmental Justice

- Capped electricity costs for low-income households, because affordable energy is a necessity, not a luxury
- Strengthened water quality protections for mobile home park residents

Lands & Water

- Secured funding for wildlife crossings to reduce wildlife-vehicle collisions, protect migration corridors and improve road safety
- Passed a bipartisan resolution defending Colorado's public lands from federal sell-off attempts
- Continued the Test and Fix Water for Kids program to keep drinking water safe in schools and child care centers
- Extended the conservation easement tax credit, equipping landowners with a critical tool to protect open space and wildlife habitat
